- As of May 16, 2006, Canada's population was 31,612,897 persons which amounted to an increase of 1,605,803 persons (5.4%) since the 2001 census. Canada's 2001 population was 30,007,094.
- In 2006, nearly 25 million people, or more than four-fifths of Canadians, were living in urban areas.
- Ontario's 2006 population of 12,160,282, is an increase of more than 750,000 more than the 11,410,046 reported in 2001 for a 6.6% increase.
- The Toronto CMA with a population of 4,682,897 in 2001 grew 9.2% to 5,113,149 in 2006.
- Mississauga; Canada's 6<sup>th</sup> largest city; had a population increase of 9.1% from 2001 to 2006. Mississauga's 2006 population of 668,549 increased by 55,624 residents from 612,925 in 2001.
- Mississauga is Ontario's 3rd largest city surpassed only by the cities of Toronto and Ottawa.

- The Census Metropolitan Area (CMA) of Toronto includes all of Metropolitan Toronto and surrounding areas, including the Regions of Peel and York and a large portion of the Regions of Halton and part of the Region of Durham.
- The Toronto CMA population has grown from 4,682,897 people in 2001 to 5,113,149 in 2006.
- The Greater Toronto Area (GTA) includes all of Metropolitan Toronto and surrounding areas, including the Regions of Peel, York , Halton, and Durham.
- Mississauga; the 2<sup>nd</sup> largest municipality in the Greater Toronto Area also experienced the 2<sup>nd</sup> highest increase in absolute population numbers of 55,624 people.

- Mother Tongue is defined as the 1<sup>st</sup> language learned at home in childhood and still understood by the individual at the time of the census.
- Canada has two official languages, English and French. 98% of Canada's population can speak one or both of the official languages and in Mississauga this is marginally lower at 96%.
- Mississauga has a diversity of linguistics and a high degree of integration without any one dominant minority language.
- Persons whose mother tongue is other than English or French make up 19.7% of Canada's total population, in comparison to 26.1% of Ontario's population, 42.6% of the Toronto CMA's population and 47.7% of Mississauga's population.

- In Canada, the most common field of study was commerce, management and business administration at 21.9%. The 2nd and 3rd common fields of study were applied science technologies & trades (21.3%) and health professions & related technologies (11.1%).
- Ontario, the Toronto CMA and Mississauga showed the same ranking order in its top three major fields of study.
- Commerce, management and business administration was the most common field of study with 21.4% in Ontario, 23.9% in the Toronto CMA, and 26.1% in Mississauga.
