This is a great opportunity for residents and visitors to explore Mississauga's lakefront communities. Each of the three featured neighbourhoods – Lakeview, Port Credit and Clarkson – offer a choice of two different guided walking tours.

Tours will operate rain or shine, and will depart from the designated meeting point. Appropriate clothing and footwear is recommended. Watch for the "Jane's Walk" Signs at major intersections near each tour.

<u>Lakeview Legacy Project Tour – from Military to Magnificent:</u>

Tour Description:

On February 27th, 2008, the Lakeview Legacy Project was presented to Mississauga City Council. As a result, a Council resolution was adopted unanimously which directed City staff to address the Lakeview Generating Station lands for use other than for a power generating facility. Minister of Energy and Infrastructure George Smitherman answered this request on July 16th, 2008 by declaring "Lakeview's future in power generation is over" and that his Government is committed to making Lakeview "The model for Smart Growth" in the Province. Thus begins the reversal of 112 years of military, industrial and utility pollution in Lakeview. The Legacy Project is the first citizen driven revitalization plan to be recognized in North American history.

We will walk the lands of the first aerodrome in Canada and visit the last firing range still existing from the WWII munitions complex in Lakeview. You will be presented with the community vision and invited to share your thoughts on an exciting future that celebrates the past.

Jim is a noted community leader and received a Citizen of the year nomination in 2007 for his pivotal role in stopping a power plant and the revitalization of Lakeview. While walking his dog through the industrial lands of Lakeview in 1994 Jim was struck by the thought "What if we could remove 98 years of military, industrial and utility pollution from our waterfront? What could we create?" This began a fourteen-year odyssey, placing a carpenter from Lakeview at the center of events that resulted in the historic announcements of 2008.

Parking: Parking is available off Hydro Rd., East of Lakefront Promenade and

South of Lakeshore Rd. E. It is a short walk to the ball park meeting

point.

Adamson Estate Tour:

<u>Tour Description:</u> The Adamson Estate is located on land that was originally granted to

Henry Cawthra. The property, known originally as "Grove Farm", was given to Mabel Cawthra and Agar Adamson as a wedding present in 1900. The Adamsons constructed the surviving baronial mansion, based on the Flemish style, in 1919. In addition to the mansion, a large barn dating to c.1875 and Canada's only wooden folly dating to c.1910 are also on the property. The estate has been restored and is now the home of the Royal Conservatory of Music. Visitors to the property will enjoy a

short guided walk around the property, with highlights including a 200-year-old Beech Tree carved with surveyor's initials, a pet cemetery, the

estate house and the folly, as well as a few intriguing stories.

Port Credit Main Street Tour:

<u>Tour Description:</u> Starting on the east bank of the Credit River, the walking tour will

traverse the Lakeshore Rd. Historic main street core, reaching the former St. Lawrence Starch company lands and return to Memorial Park. The tour will describe the urban design history of Port Credit,

examining its evolving built form. Opportunities for future

improvements will be discussed. The elements that make a successful and vibrant village character will be identified where they exist and where they could be in the future. Let's talk about trees, traffic, sidewalks, public art, plazas, terraces, linkages, parks, safety, parking, watercourses, vistas, affordable housing, building uses and many other elements that contribute to a healthy complete walking community.

What is missing in Port Credit? What is overabundance?

Ghosts of the First Nations Tour:

<u>Tour Description:</u> The walk will occur on the banks of the Credit River and Port Credit

Harbour. The tour will explore pivotal events in First Nation History. From the arrival of Ojibwe people on the banks of the Credit in early times, to first contact with the Europeans. We will envision what the Credit River must have looked like in these early years and the rich food sources of the river and surrounding lands. Let's discuss the Legend of Sky Woman, the Peter Jones Saga, and the marks left on the face of the

Credit to indicate aboriginal presence in the past.

Jane Jacobs urged us to explore our community on foot. The

Mississauga First Nation certainly did that. Our sense of community is

strengthened by their spiritual if not physical presence.

connection with the British Royal Navy? Why did the community

struggle for 16 years to save this piece of land? What is the community involvement now? What does the future hold? Come and discover all this and more. Share your thoughts on the importance of preserving

our natural heritage for present and future generations.

Clarkson Village Tour:

Tour Description: An interactive tour of Clarkson's colourful history and promising future.

The Clarkson Village Tour uses history to remind people that the places we'll see along the way were once the places where people met their friends and neighbours. Clarkson Road North is a narrow street with small, street-level buildings right up close to the sidewalk. There are no neon-clad stores set behind parking lots here. This is the kind of place where people can talk without shouting. Small stores, a church, a park with giant oaks, narrow side roads with single family homes and a natural creek that's not been encased in concrete. The old Clarkson that lies away from the Lakeshore highway is just the kind of village Jane

would have loved.
