SALMON HISTORY IN MISSISSAUGA

For most of its history, Mississauga was buried under two kilometres of ice. These glaciers, half the size of the continent, began to melt and recede about 12,000 years ago. As the region continued to warm, nomadic peoples came south to live off the rich soils the glaciers left behind. The change was a fundamental one for the travelers. It was here around Lake Ontario that people who had been hunters for generations chose to establish roots and began to farm the land. The Haudenosaunee (historically known as the Iroquois) set up small villages around Lake Ontario in what is now New York State, using the rivers to the north as a huge fishing and game preserve. The few camps that did exist by 1700 were abandoned when a second group of travelers came down from the Mississagi River region to settle the land that became southern Ontario, Into this vast open land, the Mississauga people chose the Credit River as their new home. The Credit River was life itself. Aboriginal stories tell of a time when a man could walk across the Credit from one side to the other on the backs of the salmon. A more precise account comes from the Methodist minister and Credit Mississauga chief, Peter Jones, who recorded in his diary in 1826, "I went with a party to the mouth of the River Credit to fish for salmon; caught about 140."

QUICK SALMON FACTS

- Brook trout, Atlantic salmon and lake trout are native to southern Ontario.
- Chinook salmon, coho salmon, pink salmon (together considered Pacific salmon) and rainbow trout were introduced from the west coast of North America; brown trout were introduced from Europe.
- Brook trout, Atlantic salmon and lake trout are fall spawners and do not die after spawning.
- Chinook salmon, coho salmon and pink salmon are fall spawners and all die after spawning.
- Pacific salmon can regularly attain weights of 25 lbs and the largest Chinook salmon recorded in Lake Ontario weighed 46 lbs.
- Chinook salmon eggs hatch in the spring and the majority of fry enter Lake Ontario by May or June.



Lake Ontario has always been home to varieties of these treasured fish and Port Credit was once home to a lively commercial fishing industry. Today, the fishery is recreational, with pacific salmon and rainbow trout being the most sought after fish, followed by brown trout, another

introduced species.
